

ECON 2010-90 Principle of Microeconomics Summer 2015

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Course Objectives: This course covers the basic concepts of microeconomics. This includes (i) the issues related to demand and supply, (ii) the utility maximizing behavior and indifference curve analysis in the consumer theory, (iii) firms and costs in the production theory, (iv) various forms of market mechanisms such as pure competition, monopoly, monopolistic competition and oligopoly, and (v) evaluating efficiencies of the market systems.

The powerpoint slides are served as a good summary. Supplementary videos are posted in the Canvas as well. It is recommended that you watch them. However, they do not necessarily cover every topic in the textbook.

• Assignments

- For assignments, you are encouraged to discuss with your classmates. There is a subtle difference between *collaboration* and *cheating*. As long as you understand the material (i.e. you will be able to solve similar problems later if it comes up in the exam), this can be considered a collaboration.
- All assignments are due at 11:59pm (around midnight). For more detail, please refer to Table 1.

- There will be a total of 12 assignments. I will drop the two worst assignment scores for each student at the end of the semester, i.e. those two assignments will not contribute towards your grade.
- Students will have one week to finish each assignment, except for the first assignment. The assignments will be called "quizzes" in the Canvas. There are several types of questions: true or false, multiple choices, and fill-in the blanks. Keep in mind that you can only submit the assignment once. Feel free to log-in to work on it as many times as you want, but do not submit until you are done with it. After you submit the assignment, you will be able to see your score. However, you will see the solutions after the due date has passed.
- Exam. Each exam is worth 30%. Unlike the homework, even though there is a time period of 2 days, you will have limited time to complete it once you start working on the exam. Exams will be conducted online.
