PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS All courses must be taken for a minimum letter grade of C-. A minimum GPA of 2.0 is required for graduation. Minimum credit hours: 48 (36 economics, 12 allied.) At least 18 economics credits must be completed at the University of Utah.

TRANSCRIPTED EMPHASES
