Course Objective:

This course will introduce the students to basic concepts and tools used in microeconomics. After successful completion of the course, a student will have a preliminary idea of how the market economy works, what it aims to achieve and the failures of the market economy in achieving its goals. Student will also acquire the necessary knowledge of the tools and methods used in microeconomics.

Teaching Method:

All the classes will begin with a lecture that covers the chapters mentioned in the course schedule. The classes are supposed to be interactive where questions and comments are welcome. Please feel free to ask questions on any topic discussed in the class. I am open for feedback and so never hesitate to write to me.

Assignments and grading:

II. Exams: 1 Midterm- 25% and 1 Final exam- 25%

I. Assignments (40%):

The assignments will be posted on Canvas after each section and will contain due dates of submission. Some of the questions will be multiple choices and the rest will be based on algorithms. The due dates will be clearly mentioned on the assignments and assignments must be submitted within the due dates. Late submissions will not be accepted.

II. Exams (50%):

There will be one midterm exam and one final exam throughout the semester and will be available on canvas. The take home midterm exam will be published around 22^{nd} February after the scheduled class and the take home final exam will be available around 24^{th} April. The due dates will be clearly mentioned on the exams. Exams must be submitted within the due dates. Late submissions will not be accepted.
