# **ECON 3500 - International Economics Course Information**

### **Course Summary**

The course covers history, institutions and theory of international economic relations. You will be presented alternative theories relating to the patterns of international trade, commercial policy, as well as international macroeconomics, i.e. the relationships between national income and international trade and payments, balance of payments adjustment, international monetary arrangements, and foreign investment.

### **Course Objectives**

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Understand, describe and critically discuss three major theories of international trade, relevant data patterns and major policy issues.
- Understand, describe and critically discuss the co-determination and interaction of exchange rates, interest rates and output in an open macroeconomy, relevant data patterns and major policy issues.
- Discuss the controversies surrounding trade policy and financial globalization.

#### **Required Materials**

# **Assignments**

It is your responsibility to follow emails and announcements sent through Canvas, and to stay up to date with the deadlines and course material. The grade breakdown for this class is as follows:

1. Chapter questions—18 points.

- a. They will be graded based on completion and are due at the beginning of the following class.
- b. Each assignment will have 3 questions and will be worth 1.5 points. There will be 18 assignments for chapter questions, students are required to do only 12 of them. There will be no extra credits if a student answers more than 12.
- c. Chapter questions will be graded based on completion.
- d. Late posts will not be accepted.

#### 2. Three take-home exams-42 points.

- a. Each exam will be worth 14 points.
- b. Each take home exam will have 4 questions. Students will choose 3 to answer
- c. The expected length of each answer is between 1 and 2 pages.
- d. All answers must be hand-written (either on a paper or on a digital tool–such as a tablet)--Typed answers will not be accepted.

### 3. **Final paper**–40 points.

- a. The 4rd section (in blue) of the course will be separate in 4 themes:
  - i. Production and trade
  - ii. Development and environment
  - iii. International Political Economy (IPE)
  - iv. International finance
- b. You will choose one of the themes and write a **compare-and-contrast paper** on the readings assigned for the theme you choose.
- c. The paper should be between 5 and 7 pages and is due on the 13th of December.
- d. The final paper must contain:
  - i. A thorough exposition of the main ideas of the readings;
  - ii. A comparison where points of similarity and distinction are exposed; and
  - iii. Your (well articulated) opinion.

#### 4. **In-class extra-credit activities**–10 extra points

- a. At the beginning of each class we will have a one-question review. Students will have 10 min to answer and submit it. The following 10 min will be for the discussion of the question.
- b. Each of these will be worth 0.5 extra points.
- c. These assignments will be graded based on completion.
