**Course Description:** This course is designed to help students understand and explain the economic development of South Asia (the Indian subcontinent). We will study the historical evolution of South Asia from the colonial period and a selection of contemporary topics that shed light on the development challenges. This course takes a holistic approach toward economic development. Therefore, in addition to studying the scale and composition of the economy, it also emphasizes inequality, gender, class, environment, politics, and public health in South Asia.

By the end of this course, you should be able to:

- Outline the economic history of the last two centuries in shaping contemporary South Asia.
- Explain current development challenges for South Asia.
- Understand the relevance of South Asia in the present globalized world.
