

Econ 4010 - 090: Intermediate Microeconomic Analysis

Course Description

Neoclassical principles of resource allocation. Topics include choice theory, theory of the firm, introduction to general equilibrium and welfare economics, theory of market structures, policy application and formal techniques.

Prerequisites: Principles of Microeconomics and Macroeconomics (Econ 2010 and 2020), and Mathematics for Economists (Econ 3620), or equivalent.

Fulfills QI requirement and is a core requirement for the Econ major. 3 credit hours.

Course Outcomes

By the end of this course, the successful student will be able to:

- Develop models of supply and demand behavior arising out of concepts of technology, production cost, utility and budget constraints,
- Identify and interpret market equilibria and analyze changes in equilibria arising from shifts in underlying parameters (like technological change) or tax, trade, or other policy interventions,
- Distinguish between and discuss the implications of different kinds of market structure (perfect competition, imperfect competition, monopoly),
- Understand the operation of factor markets, especially labor markets, and connect these processes to the operation of output markets, and
- Identify instances of market failure, especially those arising from information problems and externalities, and consider potential policy remedies of these failures.

Required Materials

Our textbook is Nicholson and Snyder, Intermediate Microeconomics and Its Application (12th Edition). I have ordered the electronic, "inclusive access" version of the book. The cost of the book will be incorporated into your tuition and fees – you do not need to purchase anything at the bookstore. You should receive an e-mail from Cengage (the publisher) regarding how to access the book. (Ultimately, your main access to the book will be through the "bookshelf" link in the class Canvas site.) If you would

like to have a hard-copy version of the book, older editions won't match exactly with ours but may still be helpful.

These will be administered through the Canvas site. You are required to do 5 of these for a total of 20 points (four points per quiz). You may do all six to earn extra credit. Problem Sets: 60 total points

Five times during the term, I will distribute problem sets. These will typically be distributed on Thursday and due the following Tuesday. See dates below. These should be submitted through Canvas, preferably as pdf files. If you have difficulty submitting through the Canvas Assignment interface, you can submit your work as an e-mail attachment. Final Exam: Essay: 15 points

Pick any topic of your choice from the modules that we will cover in this course and write a 3–5-page essay, through the lens of the topics/theories we are studying. Your write-up (about 3 to 5 pages, double-spaced), should broadly cover -

- 1. An introduction section explaining the main microeconomic concepts of the relevant topic
- 2. Relate your topic to real world examples
- 3. A critical review /shortcomings section
- 4. A simple policy implication or recommendation based on your understanding of the topic

5. A conclusion section
